The smoke from Canadian forest fires has repeatedly darkened the skies of our country throughout these past several months. As of mid-July, there were nearly 900 fires burning in Canada, over 500 of them were labeled "out of control," and no one knows when those fires will finally be extinguished. Our weather reports now include air quality alerts, cautioning those with breathing issues to moderate their activities accordingly. Meanwhile, we watch and hope that the winds do not shift back to those patterns we saw some weeks ago when it was actually tempting to put those Covid masks back on just to keep that grit out of our lungs.

Yet because of satellite technology and modern telecommunications, we quickly found out what was going on and why. So, even though we found it irritating (or perhaps, in some cases, a personal health risk and inconvenience), we learned how to adapt and we moved on.

But we haven't always been so well-informed or prepared to deal with mysterious things around us. I recently came across a YouTube video by "The History Guy" entitled "New England's 'Dark Day," May 19, 1780." On that day, as historian Thomas Campanella has written, "A preternatural gloom settled upon the New England landscape, and by noon the sun had been all but blotted from the sky." Many people at that time saw this as an ill omen, and some looked to the prophecies of the Bible and thought that these signs might indicate the end of the world had come.

Historians still puzzle over what caused this strange phenomenon. Recent theories point to smoke from Canadian wildfires as a likely source of this strange darkness. With no satellites and limited communication available at the time, it was not possible to investigate the cause nor to inform the public as to what was going on, so people were left to make their own conclusions.

Sadly, most people today would likely dismiss the "end of the world" conclusion as "primitive" thinking of a "backward" people. I would suggest adopting a different perspective.
